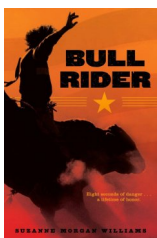


Badd

A teenaged girl's beloved brother returns home from the Iraq War completely unlike the person she remembers.

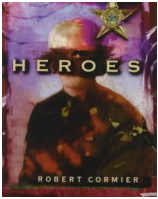


Bull Rider

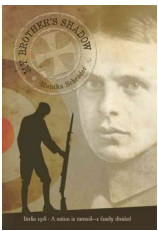


Heroes: A Novel

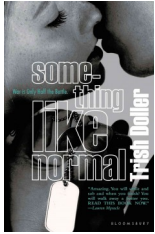


Somebody Please Tell Me Who I Am

Wounded in Iraq while his Army unit is on convoy and treated for many months for traumatic brain injury, the first person Ben remembers from his earlier life is his autistic brother.

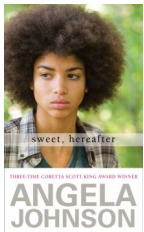


Something Like Normal
