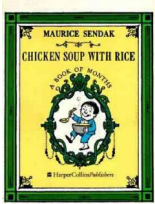
Predictable Books: Familiar Sequence

These books are examples of stories that make use of familiar sequences, such as days of the weeks, months of the year, and sequences of numbers.

Predictable books are those which, by virtue of the book's pattern, children can successfully anticipate the next word or next sentence. Their predictability encourages participation and engages children's minds. (Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Se)

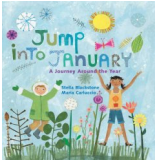
January to December, anytime is the right time to eat chicken soup with rice.

Cookie the cat gets into a different kind of mischief every day of the week.

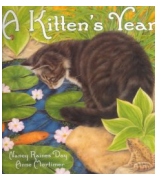


Jump Into January

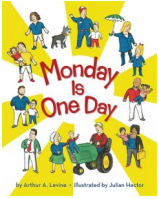


A Kitten's Year

A kitten peeks at January, toys with February, stalks March, and eventually sniffs November and dreams December as it grows into a cat through the course of a year.

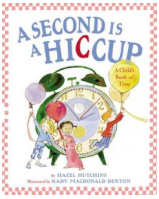


Monday Is One Day

(Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Lev)

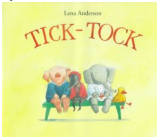
A rhyming countdown of the days of the week as a father and child find ways to spend time together while waiting for the weekend.

Each day of the week brings a new food, until on Sunday all the world's children can come and eat it up.

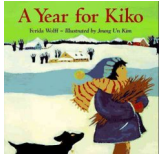


Twelve Hats for Lena : A Book of Months

Lena Katz creates hats appropriate for each month of the year.



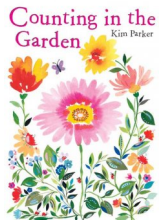
A Year For Kiko

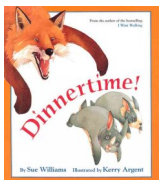


Counting in the Garden

Ten hungry mice set out on a mission to find some food, facing hazards and dangers along the way.

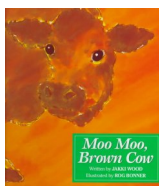


Let's Go Visiting

A counting story in which a boy visits his farmyard friends, from one brown foal to six yellow puppies.

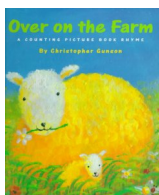


Moo Moo, Brown Cow

Readers learn about numbers and colors as a lively kitten visits the barnyard asking mother animals about their babies.

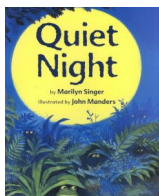


Over on the Farm : A Counting Picture Book Rhyme

Mother animals instruct their little ones to stretch, scratch, or snuggle as the reader counts the babies while wandering through farm, forest, and fields.

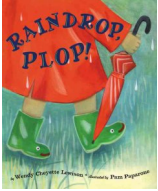


Quiet Night

One frog, two owls, three geese are joined by increasingly larger numbers of different animals that keep ten campers from falling asleep in their tent.

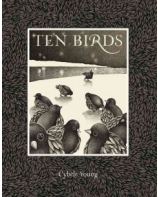


Raindrop, Plop!

A young girl and her dog find many things to count on a rainy day, both as they play outside and after they come home to a warm, dry house.

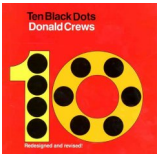


Ten Birds

Ten birds are trying to figure out how to get to the other side of the river. Will the simplest solution be the best?

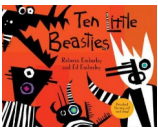


Ten Black Dots

One by one, ten little monsters appear and then disappear from the page.

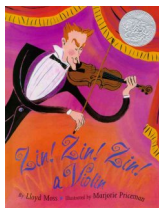


Ten, Nine, Eight
