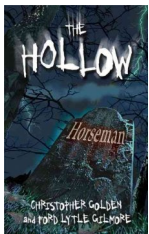


Gris Grimly's Frankenstein, or, the Modern Prometheus

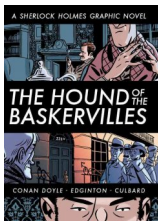

When a string of grisly decapitations occur in the famed village of Sleepy Hollow, newcomers Aimee and Shane Lancaster suspect a supernatural killer.

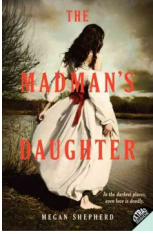


The Hound of the Baskervilles: A Sherlock Holmes Graphic Novel

Dr. Moreau's daughter, Juliet, travels to her estranged father's island, only to encounter murder, medical horrors, and a love triangle.

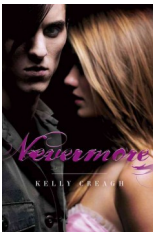

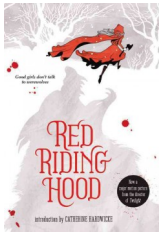
Reckoning: A Novel

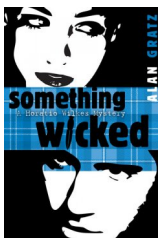


Red Riding Hood

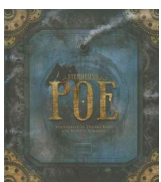

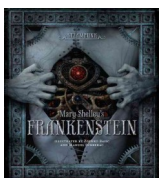

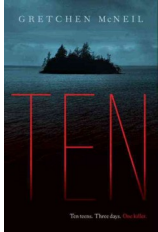


Steampunk: Mary Shelley's Frankenstein

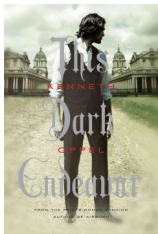

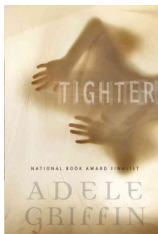
Ten teens head to a house party at a remote island mansion off the Washington coast . . . only for them to be picked off by a killer one by one.

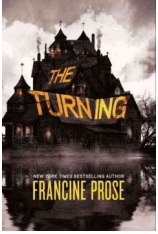

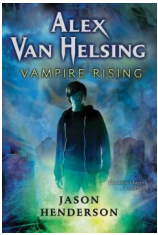
